Though 2020 is over, the complications caused by COVID-19 remain. The loss of income has caused an increase in people not being able to pay their rent or provide food for their families.

From the bottom of our hearts, we wish to thank our volunteers for dedicating their time to helping make sure that no one goes to bed hungry or without a place to call home. Because of their generous efforts, we were able to distribute 737,146 pounds of food to thousands of families and individuals in need! Our volunteers helped ensure more families were able to receive help, whether it was through the food program or through our rental and utility assistance program.

Last year, we were able to integrate **more than 1,700 unique volunteers** into our programs. But we want to highlight some exceptional volunteers who stood out with their hard work and dedication during these difficult times: Emma Regalado, Anne Burns, and Julie Sullivan!

Emma Regalado lives in Ranch Santa Margarita, works full-time at Trader Joe's and is a full-time student at Cal State Fullerton, studying Psychology. Emma has been volunteering at SCO for two years, helping in our food pantry, and discovered our organization through a friendly customer.

"I'm interested in ending homelessness in our community because, while I know where my next meal is coming from, others have no idea."

Anne Burns resides in Irvine and works part-time for the County of Orange on special projects. She worked in healthcare management prior to that. Anne has been volunteering at SCO for three years help in different roles, ranging from the front desk to events, and most recently, the food pantry.

"I'm passionate about preventing hunger and homelessness because, in a country and county with so much wealth, excess, and waste, it is unnecessary for people to go without enough food or a place to live."

Julie Sullivan resides in Dana Point and is retired after a 37-year career in sales management. Julie has been volunteering at SCO for three years helping in the food pantry. "People fall on hard times and need a hand up."

There is no possible way that we could ever show the extent of our gratitude. We could not do this crucial work without these volunteers, nor we would we want to, because they give our organization its spirit.

2020 YEARLY RECAP

IN 2020, WE HELPED:

5,540 LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS

distributing **737,146** pounds of wholesome, high-quality food and **\$338,908** in rental and utility assistance.





OUR CLIENTS WERE:

homeless families, the underemployed, unemployed, seniors, veterans and other at-risk residents of Orange County.

36% were children. **22%** of those children were under the age of 5.

659 seniors. 42% were 75+ years old, and 62% were women.

58% of our clients reported a female head-of-household.

OUR FOOD PANTRY:

provided emergency, non-perishable and fresh food to an average of **1,600 RESIDENTS** each month.



OUR HOUSING PROGRAM:

housed **26** homeless and housing-insecure families last year, helping them reach selfsufficiency by providing **14,850** bed nights.

OUR HOMELESS PREVENTION PROGRAM

paid **224** months of rent and **57** bill utility payments. **656** clients received Case Management.

DON'T TAKE YOUR HOUSING FOR GRANTED

From the time she was born until she was 21, Tiffany grew up in the foster care system – bouncing from home to home. At the age of 20, she gave birth to her daughter, Zion, and aged out of foster care shortly thereafter.

With a lack of stability in Tiffany's life, she came to realize an underlying state of depression and busied herself jumping between living situations, hoping to quell her emotional and psychological trauma. She prioritized her basic needs to circumvent this emotional turbulence, and felt secure knowing that, at the very least, her basic needs were met with a roof over her head and transportation. After years of instability, she wondered if this was all she was worth.

Having nowhere safe to go, Tiffany resorted to living in a filthy, infested motel with her daughter, who was only four at the time. Racked with a sense of unworthiness, she contemplated suicide and truly believed a stranger would provide a far better life for her daughter than she ever could. Luckily, Tiffany got the chance to sit down with South County Outreach (SCO) and secured emergency shelter for her little family that was clean and safe. Tiffany attributes being accepted into SCO's Transitional Housing Program to one of the agency's interns who took particular interest in Tiffany's case, believed in her, and advocated for her family.

With the Transitional Housing Program's budgeting assistance, career coaching, and mental health services, Tiffany finally had the opportunity to refocus some much-need attention on herself. Tiffany was already working as a Certified Nursing Assistant, but knew it was not enough to provide the life she envisioned for her family. She knew of the financial and emotional success college had afforded her friends and loved ones. Tiffany considered how a college education might better enable her to provide for Zion and, without hesitation, enrolled in Orange Coast College in August, 2020. This first semester proved to be arduous; but with consistency and determination, Tiffany was able to graduate and start her journey from existing to thriving.

As the end of her Transitional Housing Program drew to a close, Tiffany prepared to secure a home of her own, but this was challenging as she was met with rejection after rejection. Again, she wondered what the next step might be and if this was the peak of her life. Tiffany found out that her college built a series of apartment complexes just off campus, but there was still the possibility that she could not afford it, or even qualify for a unit. Still determined to thrive, Tiffany applied, qualified, and signed a lease with university housing services. Shortly after moving to her new home, Tiffany landed a position with the Orange County Department of Education and no longer questions whether she can cover her rent each month.

After years of adversity, Tiffany and Zion, now 25 and 5, reflects on one of the keys to her growing success: the unwavering support of South County Outreach. She also considers therapy to be integral to the perseverance of those who struggle to also overcome mental health issues, stating, **"if you don't feel good about yourself, you cannot reach the peaks that you are meant to see."** Having come from a trauma-based environment, Tiffany is fervent about the importance of the life-changing support of seeking help. **"If we look for help and get support, it will change our lives. I never thought in a year I could do half of what I did. I will continue to move forward because I know I'm worthy"**

Prior to the pandemic, one in three California households were already struggling to meet basic needs. Low-income households in Orange County increased due to climbing rental costs and food prices. In 2019, the area's unemployment rate was 2.6% and at the end of 2020 it was 6.4%—more than double.


